



DEADLY SKYLIGHTS!

SOLAR ENERGY AND WAREHOUSE WORKERS KILLED

A 46-year-old electrical worker, Luke J.*, and a 56-year-old warehouse worker, Roberto M.*, both died after falling through skylights while working on a roof. Luke was carrying a solar panel and tripped on the ledge of the skylight and fell backward through the skylight. Roberto was on the warehouse roof repairing a broken air conditioner. It is not known exactly how Roberto fell through the skylight.

WHAT WENT WRONG?	WHAT SHOULD BE DONE?
<p>Luke worked close to a skylight that was not guarded and didn't wear personal fall protection equipment.</p>	<p>Make sure skylights are guarded or that workers near skylights use personal fall protection.</p>
<p>Roberto went to the roof to fix the air conditioner. This was not part of his regular job.</p>	<p>Make sure workers only do work for which they've been trained.</p>

The California Fatality Assessment and Control Evaluation (FACE) program has been investigating work-related deaths since 1992. The goal of the FACE program is to prevent these deaths by informing workers and managers of worksite hazards and how to avoid them.
