# 12:15PM -American Lung Association (ALA), 1:00PM **American Cancer Society Cancer** Action Network (ACS CAN), **American Heart Association** (AHA) Legislative session update Expected Outcome: Determine TEROC next steps

Ms. Jamie Morgan and Ms. Lindsey Freitas provided a legislative update.

Ms. Morgan provided an update on Senate Bill (SB) 38 and SB 39. SB 38 had hostile amendments added as it passed through the Senate Appropriations Committee. The bill was moved to the inactive file. SB 39 is now in the Assembly Appropriations Committee.

Assembly Bill (AB) 1639 was introduced by Assembly Member Gray, who stated the intent is to deal with ecigarette use among youth. The bill includes provisions from multiple bills currently in the Assembly Governmental Organizational (GO) Committee, including marketing of e-cigarettes, flavored tobacco products, enforcement, and youth possession provisions. AB 1639 will be heard on August 20, 2019 in the Assembly Health Committee.

The bill exempts menthol in the flavor regulation component. Assembly Member Gray agreed to remove the youth possession violation from the bill. There is concern the bill may implicitly preempt local communities. There isn't specific language stating local jurisdictions are preempted, but one section specifically states locals are not preempted.

The California Medical Association (CMA) gave testimony in support of the bill with removal of the youth possession clause. ALA, ACS CAN, and AHA are in the process of finalizing their positions.

The Assembly Health Committee requires letters to be submitted one week prior to hearings. Ms. Freitas added that although the Assembly GO Committee agreed to remove the youth possession clause, the amendments have not yet been published because the Legislature went on summer recess. The bill will be updated when the Legislature reconvenes on August 12, 2019. Ms. Morgan encouraged everyone to provide feedback as soon as possible because the Assembly Health Committee is reviewing information and feedback now.

Dr. Ong stated TEROC is not interested in compromising on the exclusion of menthol and mint. The other provisions of the bill are less troubling since some of it is already being done. Other TEROC members agreed.

It was suggested that banning or exempting certain products could lead to legal issues for California. An example was given of when Indonesia launched a trade

	A question arose as to if the TEROC letter should state opposition to the youth possession clause because it has not yet been removed from the print version of the bill.
	Dr. Ong motioned to write a letter in opposition of AB 1639 as it is currently written. Mr. Castro seconded the motion. Motion passed unanimously.
	The penalty period was decreased in the bill because it should not take a retailer five years to lose their license if they are a bad actor. Additionally, there does not seem to be any conversations about increasing the fines more than what is included in the bill.
	Dr. Ong reiterated that while TEROC appreciates the effort to improve some aspects of regulation within California, they strongly oppose the exclusion of menthol in the regulation of flavors and it needs to be included in any type of flavored tobacco regulation. They also strongly support that local jurisdictions not be preempted by state regulation from passing more restrictive policies. An amendment to say "intention" instead of "effort" was suggested.
	The reasoning behind the CMA supporting the bill is not known. Dr. Ong and Dr. Oldham stated they could inquire about a reason. It was also suggested that knowledge about any specialty medical organizations opposing the bi may be helpful.
	Dr. Ong reiterated that TEROC is not interested in compromising on excluding menthol. Dr. Edith Balbach added that it is important to include that TEROC is not interested in preempting local jurisdictions from making additional laws.
